
## Flyer heaven in 2011

You don't have any pieces that you want to part with? No problem! You can come and work the other side of the tables and go home with an armload of happiness.

Thanks to the efforts of club member Richard Ridgeway, we are going to have plenty of room to spread out this year as the GGAFC hosts the 11th annual Flyer Fest West event which is coming to San Francisco for the first time. **Free parking!** In San Francisco?! You should come even if you don't buy any trains! If you think that a cathedral might be an odd place for a bunch of train guys to get together don't worry, the show will be downstairs in their Event Center where we will have about 4000 square feet for the trading hall and an additional 1500 square feet for lunch.

Paul Guaraglia and Jake Jacobsen have been spearheading the commemorative car project. There will be two color schemes for the Feather River mining gondola: a green car with orange graphics and a reverse colored orange car with green graphics. We're waiting for a mock up of the car and hope to have pictures of it posted to the club's website soon. The long gondolas are being produced by American Models for this event and Paul has already arranged for two different colored drop-in loads to go with the two different cars.

Flyer Fest West will be on Saturday, April 30, 2011 and self guided layout tours are being scheduled for Sunday, May 1. Since he wasn't available on Monday, I arranged for him to meet me there on Tuesday, 12/7 to make our club's donation.

He made a <u>major</u> donation to our effort this year. And, so the club's donation was the largest <u>by far</u> (in the 12 or so years we've done so).

For example, this year the rest of the club gave 44 items & 2 gift cards (totaling \$20). Steve <u>added</u> 40 items & 5 gift cards (totaling \$100)!

In contrast, last year the whole club gave 47 items & 3 gift cards (totaling \$55).

For anyone who is interested, Abode Services has monthly tours available in which you can meet staff and residents of the shelter and learn more about Abode Services' programs. The next one is on Tuesday, 12/14.


